<u>Mark Foundation for Cancer Research - Endeavor Award</u>	<p>Supports collaborative research projects that bring together investigators with diverse areas of expertise to tackle challenges in the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of cancer.</p>	<p>\$3,000,000 over 3 years</p>	<p>July 13, 2022</p>	<p>Teams may comprise investigators from a single institutions or multiple institutions; must have an independent tenure-track faculty research appointment; teams must be composed of one PI, and between 2-8 co-PIs.</p>
<u>American Foundation for Suicide Prevention - Focus Grant</u>	<p>Short-Term Risk: Open to innovative, potentially high-yield proposals that focus on short-term risk for suicide. Proposals should examine identification and/or intervention strategies for short-term suicide risk that can be implemented in clinical settings.</p> <p>Reaching 20% by 2025: This Focus Grant RFA seeks applications that address potential biological, psychological, social and/or environmental pathways and interventions that can significantly reduce the national suicide rate if ultimately implemented on a large scale.</p>	<p>Up to \$500,000 per year for up to 3 years</p>	<p>August 1, 2022</p>	<p>Research must be based in the United States.</p>
