Dr. Pollack is the inaugural Katey Ayres Endowed Associate Professor in the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health's Department of Health Policy and Management and the School of Nursing. He has a joint appointment in the School's Department of Epidemiology and in the School of Medicine's Division of General Internal Medicine and is a core member of the Institute for Health and Social Policy. As a practicing

physician and general internist, Dr. Pollack's research is grounded in his experience caring for patients and their families, helping them navigate complex medical decision-making and address social needs in the setting of a fragmented health care and safety net system.

A major focus of his research focuses on the **health consequences of housing policy**. In particular, his work has examines how housing mobility programs, which help families move from areas of concentrated poverty into lower-poverty neighborhoods, impact health. Through an National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences-sponsored R01, Dr. Pollack has recruited a cohort of children enrolled in Baltimore's housing mobility program to determine whether moving improves asthma symptoms and reduces allergen exposures. Through a research partnership with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, Dr. Pollack linked Medicaid and hospital all-payer data to the landmark Moving To Opportunity initiative. The findings showed significant reductions in the long-term risk of hospitalizations among children who had the chance to move to less poor neighborhoods. This research has appeared in a number of leading peer-reviewed journals including *JAMA* and *Health Affairs*. His work has received widespread public attention in leading news outlets including the *New York Times* and 60 Minutes. His research also investigates the spillover effects of housing affordability programs and place-based initiatives on health. He previously worked, part-time, as a Senior Research Advisor in HUD's Office of Policy Development and Research, on projects related to the connection between housing-health.

A second area of his research concerns **cancer health services research**, with a particular interest in **social networks** and **health equity**. He was the recipient of a career development award from the National Cancer Institute (co-sponsored by the Office of Behavioral and Social Sciences Research) that used network analytic techniques to examine variation in cancer care. He co-led a R21 that examined how provider social networks influence cancer screening recommendations and was site-PI for Movember Foundation initiatives to improve survivorship care. Most recently, he has been investigating the ways that housing security intersects with cancer outcomes. This research stream has also generated high impact outputs in leading peer-reviewed journals such as the *Journal of the National Cancer Institute*.
